Dear Mr Betts, Mr Parsons, and members of ITU-T Study Group 15,

Thank you for your recent liaison informing the IEEE 802.3 Ethernet Working Group of your work on a new Technical Report regarding "Transport network support of IMT-2020/5G".

While IEEE 802.3 has not developed any interfaces targeted specifically at mobile network applications, Ethernet interfaces are widely used in this space, and mobile backhaul applications are frequently part of the justification for projects to specify new Ethernet PHYs with higher signaling rates or longer reach. Given the role of Ethernet in client side optics supporting the Optical Transport Network, we look forward to the reference model and understanding the possible roles that Ethernet may play in the IMT-2020/5G transport network. The deployment scenarios could also prove useful in understanding the wired interconnect needs of IMT-2020/5G Networks and any potential gaps in the Ethernet family
